













Rupee Comes From








Fiscal Deficit Trends (as % of GSDP)

Special Grant

In this budget, the Government of India is providing a special package of Rs. 2198 crore to aid Manipur in its recovery. This includes support for those internally displaced, asset creation for rehabilitation efforts, security expenses and repayment of high interest loans. In addition, to give a push to capital expenditure in the state, an additional allocation of Rs. 700 crore under SASCI has been provided. The total grant of Rs. 2898 crore will be of massive support to Manipur as it works towards recovery.

Focus on Infrastructure


Improving quality of expenditure is one of the priorities of the Government. In recent years. Expenditure on capital outlay increased from 6% of GSDP in 2017-18 to 9% of GSDP in 2022-23. Between 2016-17 to 2022-23, expenditure on capital outlay increased from Rs.1428 crore to 3484 crore. During 2025-26, we aim to increase expenditure on this item to Rs. 4040 crore, a 49% increase over the pre-actuals of 2024-25.

The Special Assistance to States for Capital Investment (SASCI), a 50-year tenor interest free loan, which Government of India started in 2020-21 is an enabling factor in increasing expenditure on capital outlay. So far, the State has received about Rs. 3000 crore under this Scheme. Funds received under SASCI have been utilised to improve various sectors which include - education, health, water supply, irrigation, connectivity and security etc. While some projects have been completed, many other projects are under implementation. Continuation of this Scheme by Government of India during 2025-26 and the enhanced allocation will further provide impetus on infrastructure expenditure.

Social Sector

Social sector spending is critical for welfare of the society. The total outlay on social sector during 2025-26 is Rs. 5348 crore. Out of this, highest allocation is made for Education Sector followed by Health, Social Welfare and Welfare of SC, ST, OBC and Minorities

In the current Budget, a provision of **Rs. 628 crore** has been made to meet requirements for relief operations, construction of temporary shelters for temporarily displaced, compensation, rehabilitation etc.

Security, Law and Order

Budgetary allocation for 2025-26 under security, law and order is **Rs. 3654 crore**.

Building connectivity, Improving critical infrastructure

In Manipur's context, building connectivity and improving road infrastructure is very critical. Under Externally Aided Projects (EAP), two projects are to be implemented – Imphal Ring Road and Concrete Road with pavement in Imphal City. Further, a number of projects are taken up under Central funding besides NABARD funding under Rural Infrastructure Development Fund (RIDF). The total budgetary allocation for building connectivity for 2025-26 is Rs. 605 crore, excluding road investment under SASCI.

For addressing irrigation and flood control measures, budgetary allocation of Rs. 405 crore is allocated for 2025-26. Under EAP, New Development Bank is funding Lamphelpat Waterbody Rejuvenation Project. This Project will reduce frequent flooding of Imphal City and providing additional water for consumption purposes.

Drinking water is a critical requirement for the people. Under Water Supply and Sanitation, an amount of Rs. 630 crore is provided as budgetary allocation. Another Rs. 450 crore is the projected outlay as EAP funds for two ongoing projects – Integrated Sewerage Project Imphal City Phase II and Manipur Water Supply Scheme
